in-person experience with family and friends. The deadline to register is Monday, April 19.

At the Falcon Graduation Walk:

- Each participating graduate and up to four guests will be escorted into the Athletics and Recreation Center.
- Inside, the graduate's name will be called, they will cross the stage, and collect a
 diploma cover while their guests cheer them on. A professional photographer will
 capture the moment. Wear your cap and gown, or go casual. It's your choice!
- Caps and gowns will be available for purchase beginning Monday, April 5 in the Bookstore and online. For online purchase, students should go to fitchburgstateshop.com and enter the term graduation in the search bar.
- More professional photos will be taken at a second station, where graduates can
 pose with their guests. There will also be space for additional fun photos to
 celebrate the occasion.
- Digital photos will be shared with the graduates to download and share, at no cost.




"Red Dancers: Art Emerging from the Darkness" will be hosted virtually by the Leominster Public Library, one of the

university's Community Read partners. Visitors are asked to register in advance.


About the Program

This event features Professors Sarah Bromberg, Sally Moore, and Jessica Robey, all of the Humanities Department.

- Robey will provide an overview of the discovery of prehistoric cave art and its reception in the 20th century, and how these earliest examples of culture lead to a reassessment of what it means to be human.
- Moore will give an overview of the role of the shaman in tribal society, discuss the inward vs outward journey, and will present examples of her own shamanic masks as well as those of her students.
- Bromberg will present an overview and analysis of cave art imagery, particularly prehistoric cave art in France and Norway, with photographs. She'll discuss her students' sketching of cave paintings




Save the Date: "Translating Crisis" talk on April 21

The first-ever English translation of a seminal work of Italian history will be discussed when the <u>Center for Italian Culture</u> presents an author talk by <u>Professor Rala Diakité</u> (Humanities) and her co-author Matthew Sneider at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 21.

The virtual presentation, entitled "Translating Crisis: A New Translation of a Medieval Florentine Chronicle by Giovanni Villani," is free and open to the public. All are welcome for this opportunity to learn something new about Florence, medieval history, Italian language, and translation.

Giovanni Villani's *Nuova Cronica* is one of the great monuments of 14th century historical writing in Italy. Written in vernacular Italian, the chronicle traces the rise to glory of the chronicler's city of Florence. And yet, towards the end of the work, Villani describes a period of crisis – struggles against external enemies, urban uprisings, natural



disasters, bank failures, a brief experience of tyranny, and the impending plague of 1348.



Professor Kyle Moody (Communications Media) is the co-editor of a new book exploring the legacy of the recent cult television series *Hannibal*. *Hannibal for Dinner: Essays on America's Favorite Cannibal on Television* is published by McFarland & Company, Inc.

Bryan Fuller's and NBC's *Hannibal* only lasted for three seasons, yet it became a critical darling and grew a ravenous fanbase that remains active five years after the show ended. *Hannibal* is the very definition of a cult show, one that only grew in stature after its cancellation. The show is now streaming on Netflix.

In this volume, Moody and co-editor Nicholas A. Yanes have collected one-of-a-kind academic articles and interviews. The publisher describes the book as a delectable taster for general audiences and academics alike, great for dinnertime conversations of all type.



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
