

## **Moot Court teams continue string of strong showings**

Our students earned three awards at the recent American Moot Court Association National Championship Tournament at the Southern University Law Center in Baton Rouge, La.

Seniors Matthew Murphy of Milton and Matthew Badagliacca of Fitchburg ranked 16th after the preliminary rounds of the national tournament, winning four of six possible ballots. They also placed 7th nationally in the brief-writing portion of the competition. Students Crystal Aneke of Boston and Samantha Beauchamp of Sutton placed 9th in brief writing.




# Study abroad fair on Feb. 13
