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University's Early College High School partnerships touted

Fitchburg State student Tremaine Pinnock got a head start on his university education by enrolling in an early college program that showed him what it would take to complete a post-secondary degree.

"It's something I know I can do," Pinnock said Friday at a daylong summit about the new North Central Massachusetts Early College Academy. Pinnock is pursuing a bachelor's degree in business administration at Fitchburg State. "I feel more confident in my dreams. I can definitely achieve what I've always wanted to."

Early college programs are proven to make real progress in closing achievement gaps, Board of Higher Education Chairman Chris Gabrieli and Commissioner of Higher Education Carlos Santiago said at the summit, which

The North Central Massachusetts Early College Academy, which was officially <u>designated</u> this summer, will build upon early college programs already in existence at the member schools, creating an overarching model that incorporates their best practices and expands the number of students who can be accommodated. The program is designed to serve students who are first-generation, low-income and otherwise under-represented in higher education.





<u>ALFA</u> will host a free talk on "Bats of New England" at **2:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 29** in Ellis White Lecture Hall in Hammond Hall. Mass Wildlife's Bat Conservation Program Coordinator Jennifer Longsdorf will share her knowledge and experience regarding the most under-appreciated

and misunderstood mammal on Earth.

During her seven years with Mass Wildlife's Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program, Longsdorf has been involved with a variety of conservation and restoration projects aiding redbellied cooters, bald eagles, peregrine falcons, coastal water birds, salamanders, and more recently, bats. Bats are fascinating and unique creatures that play a critical role in many environments around the world. However, dramatic population declines have put bats in the spotlight. Discover how human activity and White-nose Syndrome have decimated bat populations. Learn the general facts and help dispel common myths and fears about these shy, gentle, and intelligent creatures. University offers free financial aid assistance

Fitchburg State University will join more than 20 other institutions offering free help on the free application for federal student aid (FAFSA) for college-bound students on FAFSA Day Massachusetts.

Every high school senior, college student, and adult-student who will be attending college during the 2020-2021 academic year needs to complete the FAFSA in order to apply for federal, state and institutional financial aid. FAFSA Day Massachusetts, a College Goal Sunday program, provides free help statewide to students and families looking to complete the FAFSA.

FAFSA Day Massachusetts is being held Sunday, Nov. 3 at over 20 locations, with additional locations available on different dates and times.

Families are encouraged to visit https://www.masfaa.org/fafsa-day-register/ to register, and to view locations, dates and times. The services are free and available to anyone entering college in 2020; low-income, first-generation students are especially encouraged to attend. Many locations will have services available in various languages.

FAFSA Day is staffed by volunteer financial aid and higher education experts available to provide families one-on-one assistance. FAFSA Day is a non-profit program sponsored by Massachusetts Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators, MEFA, and American Student Assistance.

University ensembles present "Musical Mega-Mix" tonight


