Students bound for Moot Court nationals

Fitchburg State will send at least two students to the national competition of the American Collegiate Moot Court tournament in Florida in January following their performance at the regional qualifying contest this month.

The campus hosted nearly 100 student competitors and more than 80 members of the local legal community served as judges during the regional tournament.

Matthew Murphy of Milton, a junior majoring in political science, and Riley Grinkis of Gardner, a senior majoring in criminal justice will compete in the nationals at Florida A&M University College of Law in

Orlando. Those teams that made it to the regional quarterfinals advance to the national tournament, while Murphy and Grinkis won two additional rounds beyond that mark.

"We compete against some very elite schools and more than hold our own," said Professor Paul Weizer, the longtime coach of the university's moot court team. "Matt and Riley will be a serious force at nationals."

Cloutier to be honored at State House

University Police Chief Michael J. Cloutier was named a 2018 recipient of the Manuel Carballo Governor's Award for Excellence in Public Service. This award, named for the late secretary of human services and selected by the governor, is presented to just 10 state employees each year who exemplify the highest standards of public service.

The statewide distinction recognizes exceptional accomplishments; exemplary leadership; creativity and innovation; and achievement of significant improvements in productivity or cost savings in agency operations.

"Chief Cloutier, a member of our campus community since 2014, certainly embodies those attributes," President Lapidus said. "As a first-generation college student, his drive and perseverance helped him achieve career success by overcoming some of the same early challenges many of today's students experience."




The chief is also credited with transforming the university's emergency management operations and planning with proactive strategies and tactics. He also has demonstrated an unfailing commitment to creating and delivering new awareness and violence prevention programming.

"In short," President Lapidus said, "he exemplifies all that makes our university so unique."

The chief will be recognized along with other recipients at the State House in December.



"It also runs the gamut from some of the most famous music ever written, such as Handel's "Messiah," to never-recorded works by several unheralded women composers and composers of color," said Harvey.


Faculty notes

Joshua Spero's (Economics, History and Political Science) new book, Middle Powers and Regional Influence: Critical Foreign Policy Junctures for Poland, South Korea and Bolivia (Rowman & Littlefield International, London) was published this month. He gratefully acknowledges the university community for its support, particularly during his research semester's sabbatical and in preparation for his Harrod Lecture. Spero's book analyzes why middle power impact matters, not only regionally for stronger, dominant greater power neighbors, but also for transformative middle power leaderships which proved pivotal geopolitically for their region's challenges and changes.

Eric Budd (Economics, History and Political Science) was asked to rejoin the Executive Council of the Northeastern Political Science Association as 2nd vice president. In that capacity he will help the program chair plan next year's conference, and then as 1st vice president/program chair will plan the 2020 conference in Boston. After that conference, he will be the association's president, which will be just the second time in the organization's 50-year history that a former president had a second term.

Budd also gave a dinner talk entitled "Conflict: Its Origins, Resolution and Reconciliation" at the Monadnock Inn in Jaffrey, N.H. earlier this month.

J.J. Sylvia (Communications Media) was published in the edited collection Research Methods for the Digital Humanities. His chapter, "Code/Art Approaches to Data Visualization" uses the project Aperveillance: Watching with Open Data as a case study for artistic approaches to data visualization afforded by the iterative and generative nature of coding.
