LGBTQ+ History Month observances continue

Fitchburg State's celebration of <u>LGTBQ+ History Month</u>, a series of gatherings, film screenings and participatory events developed around the theme "We Are Here," continues this week.

Tonight at 7 p.m. there will be a screening of the film *The Miseducation of Cameron Post* at Ellis White Lecture Hall in Hammond Hall. In 1993, after teenage Cameron is caught in the backseat of a car with the prom queen, she is sent away to a treatment center in a remote area called God's Promise. While she is being subjected to questionable gay conversion therapies, she bonds with some fellow residents as they pretend to go along with the process while waiting to be released.

The events continue from 10 a.m. to 2



p.m. Wednesday with our observance of International Pronouns Day, which seeks to make respecting, sharing, and educating about personal pronouns commonplace. All are encouraged to pick up your pronoun pin as a way to support the usage of proper pronouns on campus and everyday. This event is sponsored by the Center for Diversity and Inclusiveness and Gay Straight Alliance.

The programs move <u>online</u> at **3:30 p.m. Thursday** with a discussion of Bklyn Boihood's "Outside the XY Queer, Black and Brown Masculinity." The session will cover Outside the XY, an anthology of more than 50 stories, memories, poems, ideas, essays and letters--all examining what it looks like, feels like, and is like to inhabit masculinity outside of cisgendered manhood as people of color in the world. NECHE self-study draft posted and ready for review

The <u>draft narrative</u> for the university's New England Commission of Higher Education (<u>NECHE</u>) self-study has been <u>posted</u> for campus review.

The narrative was drafted by the seven standard committees with additional work and review by the Steering Committee and the self-study editor. These standard committees were populated with 90 campus representatives of staff, faculty and students. In addition, NECHE co-chairs and committees reached out to other campus colleagues for specific information and input. Set in Italy's Veneto region during the last months of the

First World War, *Noi eravamo* ("We were") recounts the stories of the sons and daughters of Italian emigrants who returned to volunteer as pilots and nurses in Italy's struggle against the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

This film was inspired by Fiorello La Guardia, the son of Italian emigrants, who was among the volunteers who came to fight in Europe, and who later became one of the most famous mayors of New York City.
