Proceeds from the "Sweet SixQueen" drag show will support the LGBTQ Student Scholarship at Fitchburg State. The program is labeled as New England's largest and oldest drag show.

Harrod Lecture series continues Wednesday

Associate Professor Elise Takehana (English Studies) will present her Harrod Lecture "Database and Algorithm as Literary Infrastructure" at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday in Presidents' Hall in the Mazzaferro Center.

In the lecture, Dr. Takehana will discuss the conflicts and overlaps between storytelling and data analysis by exploring examples in experimental literature, interactive fiction, portraiture, and quantitative approaches to studying language and literature. The talk offers several reflections on the nature of human expression in the age of big data and how that might color what we think of as "human."



CIC's "Made in Italy" series continues with talk on authenticity

The Center for Italian Culture continues its series on the "Made in Italy" brand this week with a look at the nature of "authenticity" itself.

Professor Elizabeth Krause from the Department of Anthropology at UMass Amherst will present "What's Authentic? Uncommon Lessons from Made in Italy" at 3:30 p.m.

Thursday in Ellis White Lecture Hall in Hammond Hall.

Professor Krause's presentation will draw on ethnographic research in the Made in Italy arena across two different sectors - slow figs and fast fashion - to theorize authenticity. Admission is free and open to the public.

In April, the university will welcome Fred Plotkin, co-author of the just-published Rick Steves' Italy for Food Lovers, for a guided tasting of classic Italian cheeses entitled "Formaggio Formidabile." Additional details,

Fitchburg State's yearlong Community Read of Trevor Noah's celebrated memoir Born a Crime concludes in


April with a program of personal storytelling.

Study Abroad spotlight:

Students saw "Heart of Europe" over Spring Break

The Heart of Europe program dove into many difficult and important issues from Europe's past, present and future during their voyage earlier this month. This was **Professor Josh Spero**'s fifth time taking students on an incredibly eye opening journey throughout Europe.

The group traveled across the Netherlands into Germany and Poland over Spring Break. They met with



professors, students and diplomats from Rhine Waal University in Germany and University of Warsaw in Poland. Discussions centered around the importance of transatlantic diplomacy and Ukraine.

Students had a somber day of reflection at Auschwitz Birkenau Museum and Memorial and ended the program at the breathtaking Wieliczka Salt Mines outside of Kraków.

The three-credit Heart of Europe program will run again in May 2025. It has become a signature <u>faculty-led study abroad program</u> for the university.

Committee shares the following
information on recycling: Recycling
saves energy and money. It is
estimated that one ton of recycled
plastic saves 5,774 Kwh of energy,
16.3 barrels of oil, 98 million BTUs of
energy, and 30 cubic yards of landfill
space. Here's some things you can do
when on campus:

- PLEASE separate trash from recycling! "Single stream" recycling means that only
 recyclables can be mixed with each other. If any trash is in the recycling bin, then
 the whole bin must be thrown away.
- Every room on campus should have a blue recycle bin next to the trash can. If you are missing one, contact Facilities or the building's maintainers.
- For a complete list of what can/can not be recycled, please consult the campus recycling quide.
