Plotkin, co-author of *Rick Steves' Italy for Food Lovers*, will discuss the *scambio*, or exchange of food, between Italy and America and back. Come taste how American corn made its way into Italian polenta and how a popular sandwich on the streets of Palermo turned into a classic of New Orleans. Savor enduring mealtime customs and wine pairings

as you learn about the cross-cultural influences of food. Tickets may be purchased online.

The *Nuovo Mondo* series will also present an online workshop at **6 p.m. Tuesday, April 16** on how to apply for Italian citizenship as an Italian-American. 

Three one-act plays that point out the bizarre, delightful and surreal nature of life will be presented as the university's spring theater productions in April.

The performances, collectively known as "Absurdist Alert!" will be held in the Wallace Theater for the Performing Arts in the McKay Complex at 67 Rindge Road. Admission is free and open to the public.

- "The Zoo Story," written by Edward Albee and directed by **Jo Nazro**, is absurdist in mood and explores different themes of existentialism, isolation, loneliness, social disparity, and dehumanization in a materialistic American society.
- "A Game," written by Dennis E. Noble and directed by student Allison Thompson, is
 the story of three individuals who agree to participate in an experiment in which they
 are locked in a small room divided into three "equal" sections. As they descend to
 madness, they showcase how far people are willing to go to be better than those
 around them.
- "The Lesson," written by Eugene Ionesco and directed by **Cap Corduan**, satirizes totalitarianism in education, politics, language, psychology, and sexuality.

The performances will open with "The Zoo Story" at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 25. "A Game" and "The Lesson" will be performed at 7 p.m. Friday, April 26. "The Zoo Story" will be performed again at 2 p.m. Saturday, April 27, with "A Game" and "The Lesson" being performed that evening at 7 p.m. The performances conclude Sunday, April 28 with "A Game" and "The Lesson" at 2 p.m. and "The Zoo Story" at 7 p.m.
