Commencement Ceremonies to be celebrated this week

The [Graduate Commencement](#) ceremony will be held at **6:30 p.m. Thursday** in the Athletics and Recreation Center. Face coverings are strongly encouraged, and all attendees will be asked to attest they are free of COVID symptoms. Face coverings will also be recommended (and attestation forms required) at satellite viewing locations on campus.



The [Undergraduate Commencement](#) ceremony will be held at **10 a.m. Saturday** on the main quadrangle (or at the Athletics and Recreation Center in the unlikely event of inclement weather).

The commencement address on Saturday will be given by Dr. Rosaline Cardarelli '81, who will also be presented the President's Medal.

See the new Welcome Center on Wednesday


Members of the campus community are invited to check out the newly renovated Welcome Center in the Anthony Student Service Center between 2:30 and 4 p.m. Wednesday.

Once again, the state Department of Higher Education is looking to celebrate standout graduating students from Massachusetts' public colleges and universities through the [29 Who Shine](#) awards. We are seeking nominations from faculty, librarians, staff and administration for Fitchburg State's honoree for this recognition.

The 29 Who Shine award is designed to recognize graduating students who show exceptional promise as future leaders in civic affairs or in business or professional activity in Massachusetts, having already demonstrated

an ability to contribute to the civic and economic well-being of the Commonwealth.

[Nominees](#) must be Massachusetts residents, graduating in the 2021-22 academic year (so students who graduated in December 2021 are eligible for consideration), with a strong record of academic achievement and civic engagement. Other factors that may be considered are the student's intent to pursue a career track or interest for which there is a demonstrated need in the Commonwealth, such as a high-demand STEM-related career (health care, life sciences, information technology), or a start-up business that will produce jobs, or a community service role to better the lives of fellow Massachusetts citizens (such as teaching, working in a social service agency, or community organization, etc.).

Sustainability Snapshot


Here's another snapshot from our [Sustainability Advisory Committee](#): Agriculture and our food systems have more impact on the environment than any other human activity, and contribute the largest amount of greenhouse gases. Because food is so important, two simple strategies can dramatically reduce our footprint. First, cutting down on meat and dairy, especially red meat, can reduce emissions of greenhouse gases from food by as much as 61%. And a healthier diet is a bonus! Second, 30-40% of the food supply in the US is simply thrown away. The simple act of reducing food waste has a huge environmental benefit and it will also benefit your wallet.
