ACADEMIC LEADERSHIP EXPERIENCE

Dean and Chief Administrative Officer, University of Connecticut-Hartford, 2017-present.

Inaugural academic and administrative leader of UConn Hartford. The “Dean and Chief Administrative Officer”* title is unique to the University of Connecticut system and is similar to Chancellor in other state systems of higher education with regional campuses. I lead and oversee all aspects of UConn’s new urban campus, including mission/strategy, academic affairs, student services, finance, enrollment, community engagement, inclusion/equity/justice, development, IT, library services, and operations and security. I also support our Hartford-based athletics program and Storrs-based student residences, and planning, design, and construction.

UConn Hartford (campus overview from 2022-23)

Located in the state capital of Hartford, Connecticut, UConn Hartford is a regional campus within the University of Connecticut’s 23,000 undergraduate and 8,000 graduate student statewide flagship system. Located two hours from New York City and Boston, UConn Hartford is the system’s premier urban regional campus.

- 3450 students (1650 undergraduate; 1800 graduate)
- Undergrads: 50% first generation; 51% students of color (Minority Serving Institution; AANAPISI; Emerging HSI, [top-ranked institution for socioeconomic mobility](#))
- 300 full-time faculty and staff; 100 adjunct faculty
- Undergraduate classes in 36 different departments and MA, PhD, and certificate programs in five different disciplines. Academic offerings span across seven schools and colleges (Agriculture, Health and Natural Resources; Business; Education; Engineering; Fine Arts; Liberal Arts and Sciences; Social Work)
- Urban, community campus comprised of 10 buildings and sites
- Primarily commuter campus, 200 students in off-campus residences

Guided by a strong commitment to shared governance, in collaboration with faculty, staff, students, and community members and with the support of the UConn system, board of trustees, and the UConn Hartford Board of Advocates, some of the key results achieved include:

Mission/Strategic Planning and Initiatives

- Co-developed strategic vision and mission for new campus as an anchor institution in Hartford
- Participated as core member on university-level strategic planning team
- Designed with the Hartford Public Library a community-university laboratory (in process)
- Worked with Enrollment Management and Marketing and Communications to rebrand campus with clearer value proposition

- Established, managed, and balanced budgets despite annual rescissions from state and central financing
- Worked with Board of Trustees and state official to secure a \$5MM bond for campus expansion

- Restructured unit budgets for improved accountability, transparency, and sustainability

- Increased first-year retention rate from 83% to 85%; Improved time to degree (pre-pandemic)
