generation scholarships



Gallery Exhibition: "We Are Not Okay" opens this week

The thought-provoking woodcarvings of artist C.A. Stigliano will be the subject of an exhibition this fall in the Hammond Hall Art Gallery.

"We Are Not Okay" will be on display through Friday, Dec. 13 in the art gallery inside Hammond Hall. There will be an opening reception and artist talk at **3:30 p.m. Thursday** at the gallery.

"This show, about the state of things in this country, in this culture, worries me," Stigliano writes. "All of this work has been created in the past five years. The past five years have been a nightmare of disease and deception. We live in a culture that profits from anger and fear. If a person or a class or a tribe can be made angry enough, or fearful enough, they can be sold anything; a lie, or a gun, or a horribly ungualified candidate for office.



Fear forces people to act, to buy, or to vote. Anger coupled with fear drives people to violence."

Fitchburg State is once again represented in the North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce's <u>Community</u> <u>Leadership Institute</u>, which




brings together professionals from across the region and provides them with individual leadership skills, a stronger understanding of the region and deeper connections to business and community leaders.
