Students create collateral for DA's safe driving campaign

Students in Professor Kyle Moody's (Communications Media) social media campaign class spent the fall semester designing multimedia collateral for the Worcester County District Attorney's public relations campaign to encourage safe driving for mobile phone users.

The experience was life-changing for the students and, according to District Attorney Joseph D. Early Jr., will also make an impact on members of the public who view their work.

"The work you did here is going to save lives," Early told the students when he and members of his team recently visited the class to review their deliverables for the "Eyes Up Phones Down" campaign. He recalled meeting staff in the Disability Services Office including Julie Maki and Francine Menendez-Aponte, both of whom are still at the university. "When I knew I needed certain documents, I would take the initiative to reach out to Julie and Fran and say, 'I know that next Tuesday we've got a test; has the professor sent over the test for

you to put in Braille?' It's being able to work together with people to make sure your needs are met."

Research Roundtable returns in January

The next Research Roundtable with the office of <u>Institutional Research and Planning</u> will take place at 9 a.m. Wednesday, Jan. 8 in SCI 314. This session's paper, entitled "Essay content and style are strongly related to household income and SAT scores: Evidence

from 60,000 undergraduate applications," examines how admissions essays reflect socioeconomic disparities. The paper may be viewed <u>here</u>.

The roundtable is open to all, regardless of participants' level of experience with reading or interpreting scientific papers. Whether you're a seasoned researcher or new to academic literature, your perspective is welcome and valued. Submissions sought for Salvatore Writing Prize; deadline is Feb. 14

The Arts and Sciences faculty are excited to announce a new literary prize <u>competition</u> for student writers at Fitchburg State: the R.A. Salvatore Undergraduate Literary Prizes. Open to all undergraduate writers of fiction, creative nonfiction, poetry, game narrative, and script/play at Fitchburg State, the competition will award five \$1,000 prizes to the top submissions in each genre.

Submissions will be anonymized and prize winners will be chosen by a cross-disciplinary faculty committee and announced before the Spring Convocation event. The deadline for submission to the prize competition is February 14, 2025.



The prize competition, made possible by the generous support of R.A. Salvatore '81, '91 and Diane Salvatore, is open to creative writing in any genre - fiction, creative nonfiction, poetry, game narrative, and script/play. Some contemporary forms of poetry and prose have critical elements, and the judging of the competition will take this into account. Scholarly or academic papers without any larger creative purpose or scheme are not eligible for this award. Students may submit entries in up to three genres, but only one entry per genre. Undergraduates may submit via this form.
