University planning return to on-campus learning this fall



Fitchburg State is planning to return to in-person classes and a vibrant campus life in fall 2021, President Lapidus announced last week.

"With an increase in the number of vaccinations becoming available, and coronavirus cases expected to trend downward, we are optimistic that we will be able to welcome back our students, faculty, and staff to a high-quality, on-campus experience in September," he said. "Understanding that COVID-19 will have longer-term impacts, the university is prepared to act in accordance with guidelines issued by federal, state, and local health officials. The university will continually review its plans, activities, and operations and is prepared to adjust course as necessary. As has always been the case, all decisions will prioritize the health and safety of our campus community and the city in which we reside."

The team is designed to ensure students, faculty, and staff affected by bias or a bias-related incident have access to appropriate resources and assists the university in its response in situations that may impact the overall campus climate around diversity and inclusion. The team reviews and responds to reported bias-related incidents in an educational and non-confrontational and non-punitive manner.

ALFA lecture on March 30 looks at region's role in abolition of slavery

The Adult Learning in the Fitchburg Area (ALFA) program will present a free lecture on the role Central Massachusetts played in the abolition of slavery at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 30. The Food for Thought lecture by Darren Barry is free and open to the public.

As a hotbed of antislavery activity in the mid-eighteenth century, Central Massachusetts played a vital role in the crusade to emancipate four million slaves from bondage and the ensuing Civil War that finally brought their objective to fruition.

In this provocative presentation, Darren Barry examines the individuals and families that made up the abolitionist communities of Fitchburg and Worcester. He will also discuss the complex ways in which the people of these localities chose to remember the Civil War's fundamental issues of slavery and racial equality in the decades following the conflict.

Care packages prepared for students navigating a challenging year

With students facing uniquely stressful times, it's a good opportunity to send care packages. That's the thinking behind a [new project](#) in which students were invited to sign up for themed packages that remind them of the importance of wellness and finding balance.

The care package project arose from the university's Student Affairs Division, spanning several campus offices including Counseling Services, University Police, TRIO SSS, Disability Services, Athletics, Fitchburg Anti-Violence Education (FAVE), Student Development, Alumni and Development, Student Government Association, Dean of Students' office, Career Services and Advising, and the Tutor Center.



Director of Counseling Services Rob Hynes said items were collected from different campus offices, or purchased, to be collated into a variety of themes: Be a Kid Again, Craft and Create, Get Some Fresh Air, Nourish Yourself, and The Surprise Bag. The packages contents vary, but include items like snacks, water bottles, phone chargers, coloring pages, Frisbees and hacky sacks.

University representatives are arranging socially distant “delivery” of more than 100 care packages on **Wednesday**, when classes are canceled for one of five Wellness Days this semester.

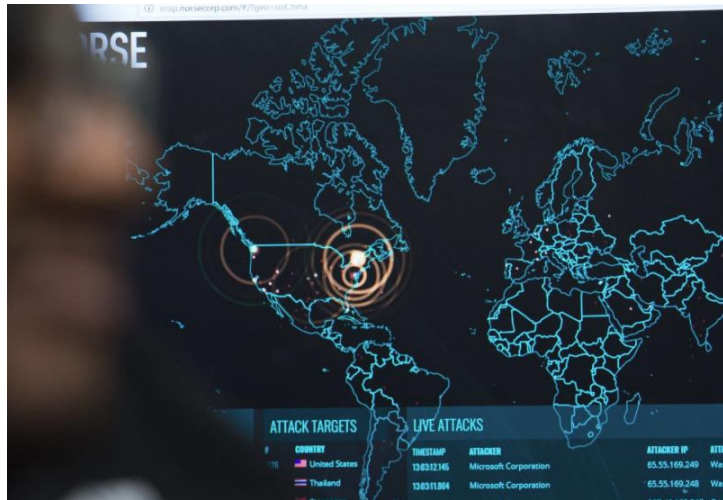

Associate Dean for Student Development and Strategic Initiatives Hank Parkinson (Student Affairs), was recently presented the Spectacular Service to New England College Personnel Association Award. The organization recognizes excellence in the field of student development.

Parkinson, who has been at Fitchburg State since 2007, said working with students and developing future leaders is one of his professional passions.

"In higher education, no day is the same," he said. Parkinson said he was inspired to get involved in higher education when he was in graduate school, and a supervisor encouraged him to pursue student development as a career path.

His advice to new professionals is to take the time to learn the culture of the institution they wish to serve. "When called upon, volunteer and sign up for tasks," he said. "If the institution is looking for commencement volunteers, sign up. Get involved with a professional association. Pick one that speaks to your interest and ideals, and get involved. Finally, balance your personal life. Work will always be there. Be sure to take care of yourself and do the things that make you happy."

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
