X Reflection:

This was an exciting year with much activity focused on expansion and support of the arts with the successful passage of two new arts programs, the restarting of planning for the black box theater, and the finalizing of renovation plans for Conlon. Despite the unexpected departure of our Police Academy Director, we were able to hire an interim director who has successfully mounted our summer Police Academy. Faculty members continue to report increased stress due to the escalating needs of their students and the growing demands of advising. In response, the school has engaged in ongoing discussions at both departmental and administrative levels to identify the most effective and optimal methods for teaching, advising, and service. These efforts aim to better meet the evolving needs of the entire academic community. Remarkably, even with substantial teaching and service obligations, faculty in the School of Arts and Sciences have continued to produce noteworthy research and creative works, reflecting their dedication to their fields and to the university's mission. This perseverance highlights the resilience and passion of the faculty, who strive to balance their multifaceted roles while contributing valuable knowledge and creativity to their disciplines.
